The meeting began with a slideshow of 2015 highlights.

Rev. Wendy Tobias opened the meeting at 6:45PM with prayer.

Vestry

2016 Vestry nominees are Byron Cameron, Colleen Fritts, and Rachel Oyler. A motion was made by Barbara MacKenzie to close the nominations, seconded by Janet Gibson, approved unanimously.

The nominees were unanimously approved to the vestry by voice acclamation.

Junior Warden's Report



This is Ric Filer writing for Sam Mancuso. As you may know, our junior warden and 30-year member of St. Joe's family moved away several months ago. Sam served 4 terms on the vestry, one as senior warden and most recently as junior warden. We will miss him. I'll try and cover some of 2016's church facilities highlights.



Last year our long time church sexton, Pablo Melendez, retired to take care of his wife Carmen. We wish them well and miss them too. As we searched for someone to fill the position, we decided it was a good time to perform a long overdue interior renovation on the sexton's house. We replaced the complete kitchen and elements of the bathrooms as needed. New ceramic tile floors were installed and everything was repainted. Many other details were taken care of as well.



We want to welcome our new sexton, David Joel Baskin, who joined us last fall. David has proved to be a great fit for us. Along with jumping right in to perform regular duties, David was instrumental helping to complete many of the sexton house renovation tasks. He also worked closely with the school to resolve an irrigation issue saving the church a fair amount of money in water bills.



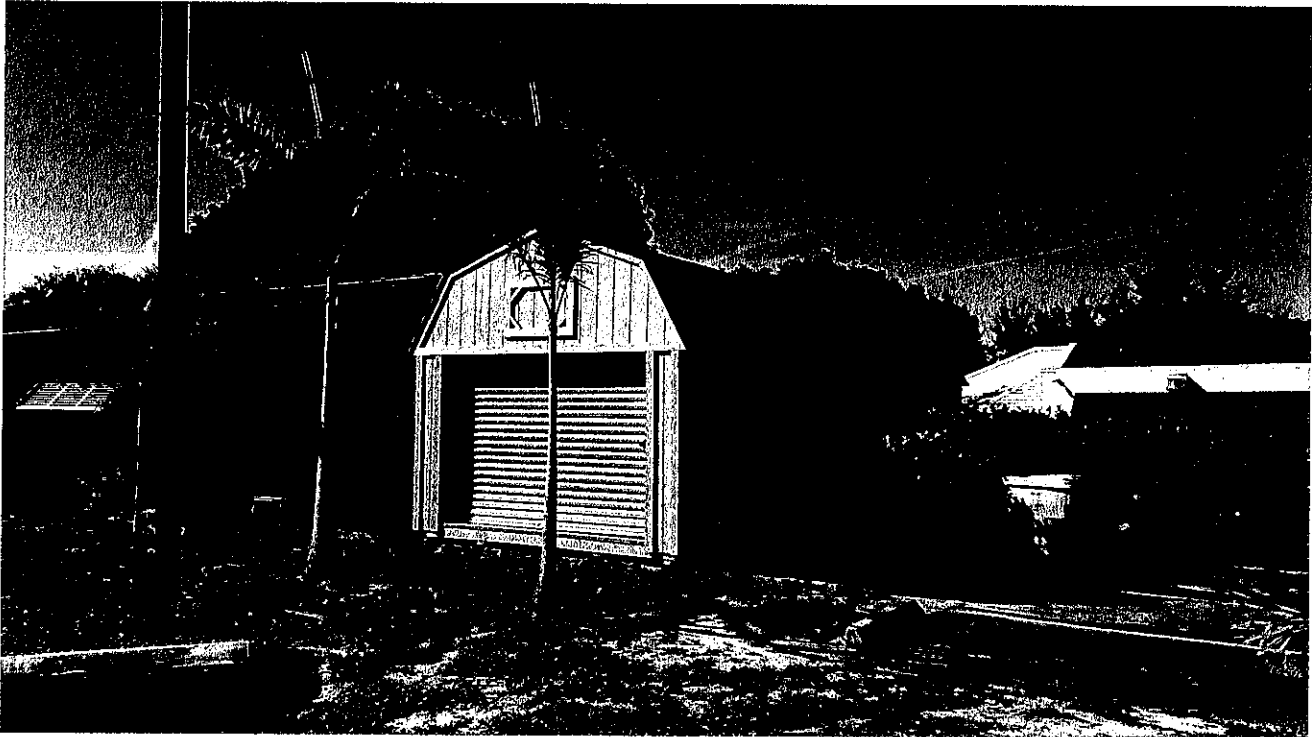
Over the years, some as junior warden, Tad Knutsen has been a big part of keeping St. Joe's in working order. We are grateful for Tad Knutsen's many contributions. Tad has been ill, no longer able to do the work around the church he loves. Our prayers are with him.

Final roof repairs on the Youth House and office areas have been completed. The church and parish hall roofs were cleaned just in time for Christmas. To keep other areas clean, we purchased a commercial grade pressure washer with a special sidewalk cleaning attachment, and expect you'll start to notice a difference.



Our new maintenance shed has proved a big advantage. Ray Mills has continued work on the interior with painting, organizing and building a work bench.

Some of our new Christmas Pageant animals were created in the shed by Ray. The Brotherhood is looking forward to making good use of the shop as well.



The old HVAC unit in the NW corner of the church has been replaced as it had failed again and was getting too expensive to keep repairing.

The church fire alarm system had been giving frequent trouble codes, once even resulting in a visit from a big red truck full of Boynton Beach firemen... fortunately, not during a service. We worked with the alarm company to upgrade some parts of the system and have since been mostly trouble free. We'll continue working to make sure the system is doing its job.

Exterior lighting improvements are ongoing. Several fixtures around the parish hall, offices and church have been converted to LED. Timers have been installed so the Youth House exterior will now be brightly lit from dusk to dawn for increased safety; lamps will be converted to LED as they burn out. We are in the quote/engineering phase of replacing the north side parking lot lighting, also with LED. Between lower cost of electricity and decreased maintenance, LED lighting typically has a payback of 2 to 3 years.

The columbarium gates are in the process of being replaced through a generous contribution. The new gates will be of stronger construction, a slightly different configuration and all the old keys will still work.

Thanks to all who have helped with church projects this past year. I'm sure I've missed naming many, please know that you are appreciated. We hope to accomplish many church facility projects in 2017, if you have an idea you'd like considered, or a skill to provide, please let someone on the vestry know.

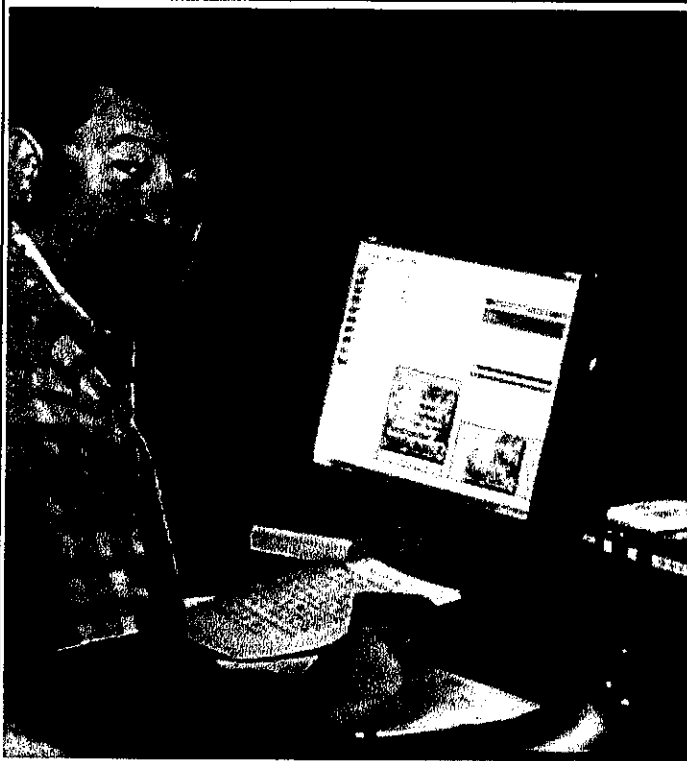
In January 2002, I left JFK and started a new career in telecommunications as the VP of Operations for Communications Resource Management.

Ric Filer

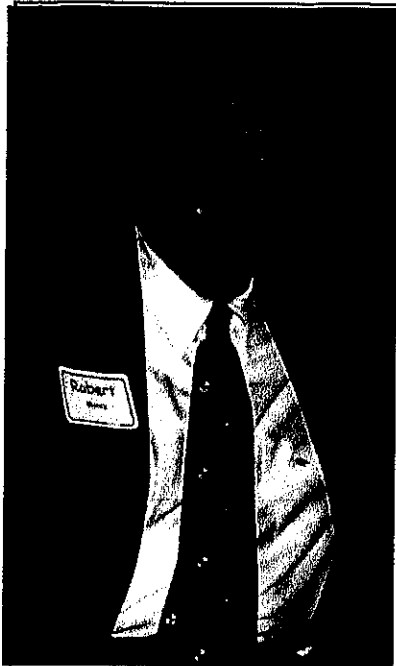
I've been a member of St. Joseph's since 2002. My wife Jean and I had to relocate in late 2010 to Virginia for work, but are now glad to be back with our church family.

Marty announced that, given an expected shortfall for 2017 we would not be able to continue to have an Associate Priest at St. Joseph's unless we could raise the funds. Well, along with a small grant from our Diocese, and a 22k anonymous matching grant challenge, you did it! Your Associate Priest position is good for 2017 and I am grateful that I am the one in that position. Your overwhelming support is heartwarming and so appreciated.

Word Beyond Words service the second Sunday of Lent was well received and will continue.

Our 20s/30s Bible Study read a book by Brian McLaren called *We Make The Road By Walking* and we were blown away that he accepted our invitation to attend our last night. What was planned as a dinner party celebration turned into a fabulous evening with Brian and his wife, Grace. Brian is an internationally known author and leader in the Emergent Church movement and a cutting edge speaker and conference leader. What an honor that he would grace us with his presence.

We received a grant from Episcopal Ministries this year to begin a Human Trafficking Awareness and Action Committee. As part of that grant we are to have two events one of which we held last September in this area's premier showing of the movie *SOLD!*. We raised nearly \$1000 and split it evenly between a local shelter for women rescued from Trafficking and a global effort in India to rescue and educate girls and boys, young women and men, caught in trafficking.

Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic – 21 of us served there from March 6-12, 2016. 25 will go this March with 9 from the Unplugged congregation and the Rev. Jean Beniste from Holy Redeemer.

We continue to give thanks for our gifted musicians of Live Hymnal, and our amazing Youth Band, both led by Charles Milling. We could not offer Unplugged without the dedication of our 36(!) loyal volunteers. Thank you! Special thanks to Sherry Thomas for doing projection for us EVERY week and to Wes Larson and Fitz Gabriel for helping with set up week in and week out.

St Joseph's Ministry of Acolytes

Minister of Music Report



The tasks of a Music Minister may seem obvious: rehearsing choirs, practicing, selecting music, ordering music, arranging, etc. However, as I look back over this past year, I realize that most of my “thought energy” went to something I call “equipping.” To me, the word equipping means providing the things that are needed – that we already know how to use – and the things that will move us into new possibilities. One of the best examples of equipping over the past several years is the addition of the new music building, which equips our church with a space designated for the work that needs to be done.

Equipping can also be visionary – there are those people who can see that something will make a difference, whether or not they know exactly what that difference will be. I would like to lift up the name of Olive Gill as a visionary. Olive always considered herself to be a part of our choir even though physical limitations prevented her from participating more than a couple of times each year. Somehow, in those brief times of being present, she could see that our church needed to have a better piano – or she just heard me talking about it openly. In her final days of life on earth she made it clear that she wanted her piano to be given to the church. Little did she know that this would immediately launch some new things – a 20-minute Prelude before the Saturday 5 o’clock services and additional Prelude music on Sunday mornings. She knew that her piano was truly a “baby” grand at only 4’ 8” and that we might want to have a “grander” grand at some point in the future, but without her vision and her gift, we probably would not have gotten started along this path so soon.

Our choir also equips our church. It is without a doubt that as much as our annual budget equips the music program with needed materials, the *people* of our choir (BTW – there were 28 on Christmas Eve!) equip our times of worship by the gifting of themselves in leading congregational singing and providing anthems that amplify wonderful and meaning-filled texts. Between Thursdays and Sunday, most of our choir members give 5 hours a week of their time! *That’s equipping! That’s stewardship! That’s love!*

So, Olive – and anyone else who possesses such Oliveness – has truly equipped us for the work of ministry and I believe we’ve only just begun. I believe that God wants us to make the extraordinary from the ordinary and will equip us to do so. I believe that God wants us, in community, to share generously of our time and resources, and provides us with it first. On the bulletin board in my office work area is my Wish List, which I’ve subtitled: “Equipped for Ministry in the Extravagance of God’s Love.” The vision comes first and the rest follows. As J. S. Bach always autographed his musical works: *Soli Deo Gloria* – to God alone be all glory.

Some highlights of this past year are:

A profound worship experience with the "Word Beyond Words" service on the First Sunday of Lent – meditation, chanting, singing, instruments, drama and "The Lord's Prayer" in sign language.

Singing children – on key and with joyful hearts.

Music enhanced by vocal soloists, trumpets, trombones, timpani, cello and oboe at special services.

Choir music that is led more by the Holy Spirit than the Director of Music – with a wide range of meaning-filled moods and texts.

The 3rd Shrove Tuesday Koko Konzert, featuring Koko The Gorilla, Russell The Crow, a handbell solo, flying monkeys and poetry written by Koko and read by members of our JAM! Choir.

Attendance at the all-inspiring biennial national convention of the American Guild of Organists (AGO), in Houston.

Our "JAM! Choir" (JAM stands for Joy And Music) children have continued to sing on a monthly basis and are now beginning to be intentional about teaching some of their songs to the congregation so that everyone can enjoy singing them. The choir program offers two different times for rehearsing – Wednesdays at 4 o'clock for 60 minutes and Sundays at 11:00 for 20 minutes. The Sunday experience allows many to participate by focusing on just the music of the current month. The Wednesday experience allows more time for voice teaching and song learning, especially songs that will be sung in future months – AND – the children are all learning to play basic melodies on the piano! But even more important, the longer time frame on Wednesdays allows time to do what we actually pray for each week when we start our rehearsal: "God, help us to know you better, to know Jesus better, to get to know each other better and to learn our music." Whether it's a Wednesday or a Sunday, we take time to read a brief passage from the Bible and talk about what it might mean in the context of our lives.

Thank you, people of St. Joseph's Parish, for continuing to support me in my ministry. As of January 8, 2017, I've been "on the bench" for 50 years and I can tell you it has been quite a journey. I'm looking forward to going back to Williamstown, Vermont to gift that original church with a concert, thanking them for taking a chance on a 12-year old child with only 2 years of piano lessons under his belt. I look forward to another great year with many more new, different and surprisingly delight-filled opportunities for ministry in the name of Christ.

Holy Redeemer Dinners



"Feed the hungry and help those in trouble. Then your light will shine out from the darkness and the darkness around you will be as bright as day (Isaiah 58:10)."

On the second Friday of every month, volunteers from St. Joseph's bring the light of Christ to needy often homeless people at Holy Redeemer Church in Lake Worth. We nourish their bodies with a hot and healthy meal, and we hope to nourish their souls as well.

There are currently 24 volunteers who serve on a rotating schedule. We each shop for and bring a component of the menu, which may be 96-oz lasagnas, bread and butter, meatballs and sauce, salad ingredients, lemonade, bananas and other fresh fruit, and dessert.

We arrive at 3:30 p.m. and begin to heat the meatballs, slice and butter the bread, plate the dessert and prepare the salad, which includes beans, corn and cheese as well as lots of veggies. At 4:30 p.m. we gather our guests for prayer. Dinner is then served to our brothers and sisters in Christ. We usually serve 30-50 people, mostly adults but often children as well.

We are blessed with a dedicated group of volunteers and are especially happy to have young people and children joining us this year. Their cheerful smiles are a gift to all who attend.

There is always a job for parishioners who feel called to help. If you can't be physically present on Fridays, donations of food are welcome. Fresh fruit and desserts, home baked or store bought, are needed. We are deeply grateful to all of St. Joseph's volunteers who support us with their time, donations and most of all prayer.

Sunday School is for children from Nursery through 5th grade and occurs during the 9:30 am service. Children are escorted back to their families in church before Communion. Curriculum is from Godly Play, Living the Good News, and Weaving God's Promises.

Godly Play every third Sunday in Sunday School for preschool through first grade. Using the Episcopal curriculum Godly Play, children experience "the holy" through storytelling techniques. Returning facilitators are Sarah Barnes, Gail Drane, Barbara MacKenzie, and Christine Pedic. Susan Hillman has joined Godly Play this year.

Gospel Play, every third Sunday during Sunday School, second through fifth grade students learn about the Gospel by experiential learning using creative drama, art & movement. These creations are displayed at 4th Sunday All Ages Worship. Gospel Play Sunday School Teachers are Caroline Tummino and Dee Zlatic.

Shepherds assist children in church and alert Sunday School classes when to return to church. Shepherds for 2016-17 in order of Sundays are the Flynns, Boddickers, Franklins, and Marsha Farmer.

All Ages Worship every fourth Sunday, students attend All Ages Worship with their families. JAM!Choir sings. Students serve as lectors. GospelPlay provides an illumination to that Sunday's Gospel. Although there is no Sunday School, childcare is offered in the Nursery for young ones whose parents feel may not be ready to attend a full church service.

Family Ushers serve every fourth Sunday. Our families in 2016-17 are The Haddads, and Reisert/Cianciolo families. The Flynn family also serves every fifth Sunday and as needed.

Children's Choir:

J.A.M.! (Joy and Music) choir is directed by David Clyle Morse for 2nd thru 5th grade students. Mrs. Jennifer Boddicker is Choir Parent and assists David with rehearsals. There are currently 5 members of the choir.

Toddlin Together Classes

Designed for babies through children "not-in-preschool yet" and their caregivers, Parishioners Georgia Handy and Nancy Jones facilitate this group that meets weekly. This program serves church families as well as the community outside our church.

Additional Children's Ministry Information:

- ☐ Childcare for various ages is provided from 9 am through 12:45 pm (the end of the Unplugged Service). Childcare is also provided at special services and/or events as needed (i.e. Episcopal 101, Annual Meeting, etc). We are blessed to have Patricia Sheaks and her father Oscar Sotomayor (lovingly called Papy) and Stephanie Wrona as ongoing childcare staff. Georgia Handy is support staff.
- ☐ Holy Baptism - The Sunday School classes return early to watch the baptisms at the 9:30am Service. The newly baptized receive a faith chest (by Brotherhood of St Andrew) filled with personalized, age-appropriate items created and donated by parishioners and the church organizations. Items include plush bear (DOK), hand-stitched baby quilt (Sassy Sewers), Christian books (ECW and DOK) and music and a personalized hand-crafted baptismal banner (Janet Gibson, Joan Fox, Jean Thayer). Event Coordinator Cher Sandhoff coordinates the special coffee hours. Photographers capture the momentous event. On the fourth Sunday in January, we celebrate the newly baptized at the 9:30 All Ages Worship with a projected slide show of the baptisms and a presentation of the personalized banners. This year, a total of 10 children and 1 adult were baptized.
- ☐ Holy Communion Milestone - This series of classes for First and Second Grade (or older) students and their parents is offered to our parish and school. In 2016, the Reverends Mary Naughton and Lynne Jones taught the classes and were assisted by Mrs. Jennifer Williams 8 students and their families studied together. Holy Communion Milestone Eucharist was on May 15, 2016.
- ☐ Acolytes - 3rd-5th grade students join youth volunteers to serve as acolytes for the 9:30 am service. Because the younger acolytes miss Sunday School when serving, Sherry Thomas, Acolyte Director, works to schedule them on Sundays when there is no Sunday School.
- ☐ Vacation Church Camp - This 6-day summer offering occurred in June. See separate report. Next page
- ☐ Special Events - Children's Ministry special events include Sunday School Kick-off, old-fashioned carnival games on the Sunday closest to Halloween, Christmas Eve Nativity reenactment, Epiphany reenactment, Palm Sunday reenactment with live donkey, Easter's egg hunt, and the end of Sunday School year church picnic. Special Events Chair Sylvia Jimenez continues to coordinate these activities.
- ☐ Christmas Eve The 4 pm service had the annual "spontaneous Christmas Pageant" for children. There is no rehearsal for the children. Instead, Father Marty chooses children by whomever he sees raises their hand first. Adult volunteers costume all children who want to participate. Throngs of children participate. The additions in 2016: Parishioner Ray Mills created all new animals for this service including camels for the kings, Kyle May and a team of volunteers sewed new fuzzy sheep costumes. The JAM!Choir, dressed as angels, sang as usual. New for 2016, JAM!Choir greeted, handed out halos, and assisted with lighting candles for Silent Night. JAM!Choir member Katie Poquette sang the annual angel's solo.

At the 6:30pm service, baby Jesus was played by newly born Madeleine Malkemus, with parents Charleston and Talle as the holy family, and her almost 2 year old brother Dublin as a shepherd. Cousin Dulcinea played the star.

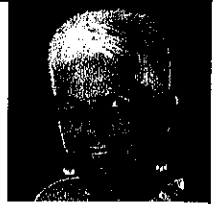

LAY EUCHARISTIC MINISTRY



Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs), also known as “Eucharistic Visitors” in some parishes, are a vital lay ministry in our parish. According to Title III, Canon 4, Sec. 7, a Eucharistic Visitor is a lay person authorized to take the Consecrated Elements in a timely manner following a Celebration of Holy Eucharist to members of the congregation who, by reason of illness or infirmity, were unable to be present at the Celebration. In performing this Celebration, the LEMs carry and extend the true meaning of the “Body of Christ” within our parish.

In 2016 Saint Joseph’s Episcopal Church was blessed with nine (9) Lay Eucharistic Ministers:

Jim Coull, Gail Drane, Betsy Hvide, Bob Lees, Barbara MacKenzie, Katherine Metzger, Christine Pedic, Gary Riggs, and Bobbie Smith. Through the Church Office, Gary coordinates the assignments of LEMs to communicants requesting the Eucharist who were otherwise unable to attend this day’s mass.

At the conclusion of Celebration of Mass, especially the 9:30 service, you may observe the communion kits containing the elements blessed in that day’s mass being assigned to LEMs. Those needing LEM visits make their presence known to the parish office or any LEM so a visit may be arranged. The average interval between visits is two weeks. In 2016 Saint Joseph’s LEMs made about 104 visits and celebrated with about 195 communicants. The Mass of Celebration is an abbreviated liturgy that mirrors the services in the BCP. A typical visit lasts 20-30 minutes.

LEMs are required to be bold professors of faith and Christ’s love, and to be intimately familiar with the LEM service as well as the prescribed methods for care and presentation of the blessed elements. Some personal qualities common among all Saint Joseph’s LEMs are a commitment to follow Jesus Christ with love and a path of Christian growth, life by the Baptismal Covenant, faithful in prayer, worship, and Bible study, compassion, commitment, dedication, great interpersonal and listening skills, vulnerability and humility.

Some LEM areas of expertise are:

- The basic content of the Book of Common Prayer.
- The theology and meaning of the Eucharist.
- The structure of the Eucharistic liturgies used in the congregation where licensed.
- Practical skills needed in the distribution of the elements.
- How to respond with dignity to situations that may arise during administration.
- The names and functions of liturgical vessels, linens, and furnishings.
- What to do with consecrated elements not used in a service.
- The nature of the church as community and the need for each member to be included in it.
- The principles and concerns of ministry with the sick, the aging, and the infirm.
- The origin and development of Eucharistic Visitors and the relevant canons.
- The history of this ministry and the responsibilities of the LEM to the parish.
- How to use the lectionary.
- Practical matters related to visiting a person at home or in another setting.
- Basic matters of Pastoral Care.
