The First Lesson

Acts 10:34-43

Reader: A reading from Acts, chapter 10, verses 34 through 43:

Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Reader: The Word of the Lord.

ALL: Thanks be to God.

The Second Lesson

1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Reader: A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 15, verses 1 through 11:

I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you--unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five

hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them--though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Presentation and Examination of the Candidates

Celebrant: The Candidates for Holy Baptism will now be presented.

*Then the candidates, unable to answer for themselves,
are presented by their Parents and Godparents, as follows:*

Parents: I present Michaela Betty DeSell to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Parents: I present Jasmine Dorothy Anderson to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Parents: I present Ivory Rose Gilbert to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

*When they have been presented the Celebrant
asks the Parents and Godparents:*

Celebrant: Will you be responsible for seeing that these children you present are brought up in the Christian faith and life?

Parents and Godparents:

I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you by your prayers and witness help these children to grow into the full stature of Christ?

Parents and Godparents:

I will, with God's help.

*Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the Parents and Godparents who
speak on behalf of infants and younger children:*

Question: Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God?

Answer: I renounce them.

Question: Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God?

***Answer:* I renounce them.**

Question: Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God?

***Answer:* I renounce them.**

Question: Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior?

***Answer:* I do.**

Question: Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love?

***Answer:* I do.**

Question: Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord?

***Answer:* I do.**

*After the candidates have been presented,
the Celebrant addresses the congregation, saying:*

Celebrant: Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?

***People:* We will.**

Celebrant: Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant. Do you believe in God the Father?

***People:* I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.**

Celebrant: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

***People:* I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand**

of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People: **I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.**

Celebrant: Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?

People: **I will, with God's help.**

Celebrant: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

People: **I will, with God's help.**

Celebrant: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

People: **I will, with God's help.**

Celebrant: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?

People: **I will, with God's help.**

Celebrant: Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

People: **I will, with God's help.**

Prayers for the Candidates

Celebrant: Let us now pray for **Michaela, Jasmine** and **Ivory**, who are to receive the Sacrament of new birth.

A Person appointed leads the following petitions:

Leader: Deliver them, O Lord, from their way of sin and death.

People: **Lord, hear our prayer.**

Leader: Open their hearts to your grace and truth.

*When this action has been completed for the candidates,
the Bishop or Priest, at a place in full sight
of the congregation, prays over them, saying:*

Celebrant: Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them inquiring a discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works.

ALL: Amen.

*Then the Bishop or Priest places a hand on the person's head,
marking on the forehead the sign of the cross [using Chrism if desired] and saying:*





The Communion

- ***All baptized persons are welcome at the Lord's table to receive His Body and Blood in the form of the consecrated bread and wine.***
- *If you are unable to come to the altar rail for communion, please tell an usher when he or she reaches your pew that you would like Communion brought to you. The appropriate response after receiving the bread and the wine is "Amen."*
- *The host may be received on the tongue or in your hands. Please extend your open palms, one hand over the other, to receive in your hands.*
- *If you prefer to have the host intincted in the wine chalice rather than drinking from the cup, please receive the host into your hands and let it remain there. The chalice bearer will dip the host into the wine for you.*
- ***All baptized children are welcome to receive Communion.*** *If you desire that your child or children do not receive communion, please ask them to cross their hands over their hearts to receive a blessing.*
- *If you prefer not to receive Communion, and wish to receive a blessing instead, hands crossed over your heart will indicate this to the clergy or Altar server.*

Would you like prayers for your special intention?

See the "Daughters of the King," an official prayer ministry within our church, in the Lady Chapel. After receiving communion, go to the Lady Chapel (to the left facing the front of the church), where members of the Daughters are ready to offer confidential prayer for any of your needs – illness, healing, support, safe travel, or thanksgiving.

THIS YEAR, WE ARE ADDRESSING:



AFFORDABLE HOUSING:

104,000 families in Palm Beach County are paying more than 30% of their income towards rent. They are one paycheck away from homelessness. This year, PEACE is advocating for millions of dollars to create rental units for people making below 60% of the area median income.



MENTAL HEALTH & ADDICTION:

In 2020, almost 49,000 adults suffered from a serious mental illness in our County, but only 46% got the help they needed. There is a lack of public services available for people suffering from mental illness. This year, we are focusing on expanding access to treatment.



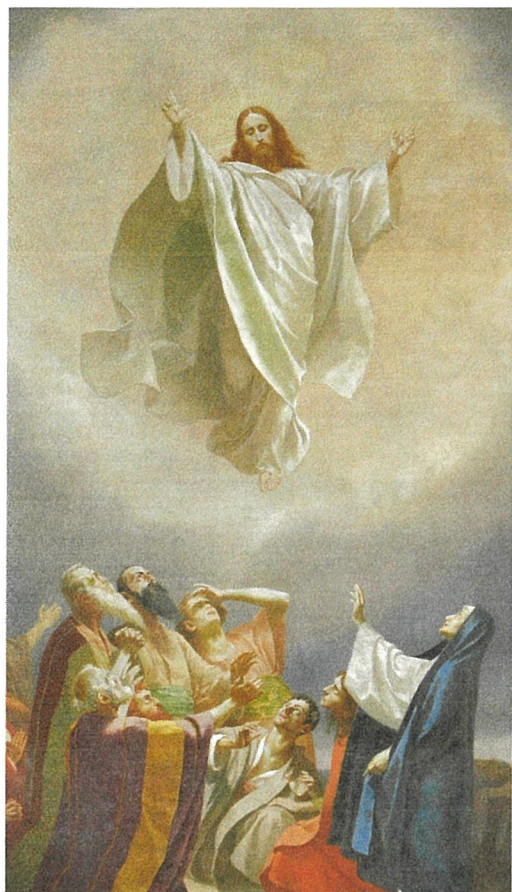
POLICE-COMMUNITY RELATIONS:

Every year, thousands of African-American and Hispanic residents of our community experience “investigatory” stops for minor things like rolling stop, light too dim on the license plate, or sticker in the wrong place. When stopped, members share they are often asked questions like “whose car is this?” or “what are you doing in this area?”. This creates a lack of trust of the police, which is bad for all of us! This year, we are focused on getting Sheriff Bradshaw to track data on ALL traffic stops to identify and address racial profiling.

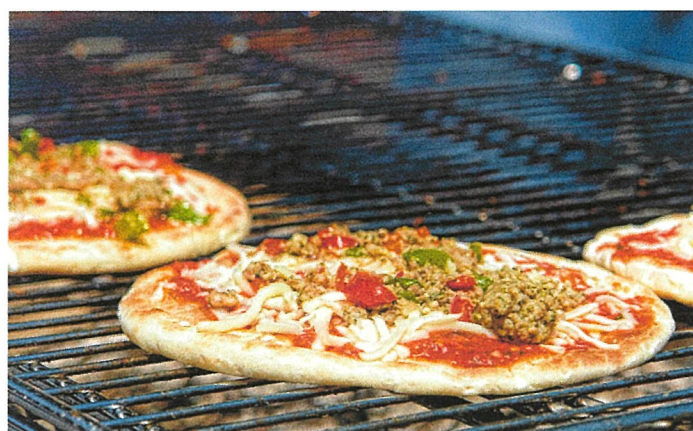

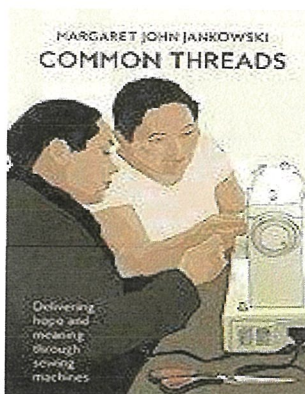

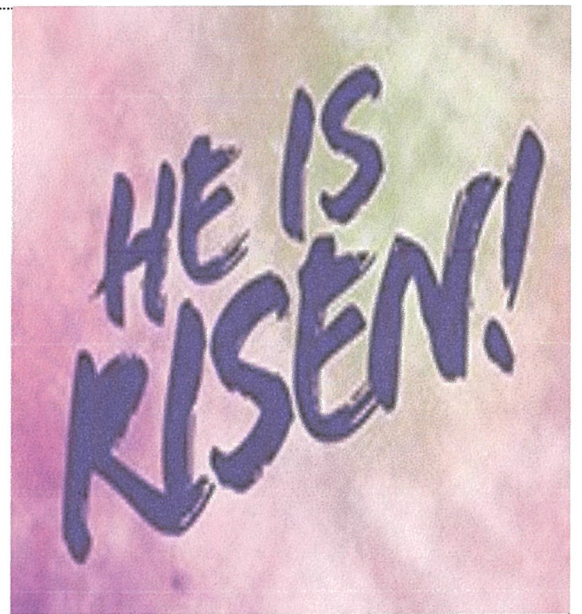

A Prayer for the Week: Living God, we thank you for your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, who has conquered sin and death for us through his death and resurrection. Amen. Christ is risen! Alleluia.

Mealtime Prayer: Dear God, for this gift of food and for the resurrection of Jesus Christ we give you thanks for your steadfast love that endures forever! Amen.

A Blessing to Give: May the risen Christ bless you with hope and joy



DEVOTIONS Read: John 20:1-18.

Mary came to the tomb early in the morning when it was still dark. The darkness versus light theme is found from the beginning of the Gospel of John, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5) When we gather in worship on Easter Sunday, we expect light and beauty to fill the sanctuary. That is not the story of the first Easter in the Gospel of John. It includes more references to death and the tomb than the other three Gospels. Death and darkness are realities, even on Easter. There is confusion and misunderstanding, including Mary not recognizing Jesus and two of the disciples not understanding that Jesus "must rise from the dead" (v. 9). Perhaps John wants us to dwell a little longer on the reality of death and darkness that surrounds us, even today. A closer look at the frailty and sorrows of life and our own misunderstandings makes the message of Christ's resurrection stand out all the more. It might just make Easter even brighter, our hearts even warmer, and our hope even stronger. Christ is risen! Alleluia. Discuss: What is hard for you to understand about the resurrection? Pray: Almighty and everlasting God, for your glory and power over sin and death we sing your praises now and forever through Jesus Christ, the one who died so that we may live forevermore. Amen.

SERVICE Jesus calls us to serve our neighbor in love. Based on the Daily Bible Readings and theme for this week, how can you give hope to someone going through a tough time?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS Alleluia means "praise the Lord." The word Alleluia is traditionally not used and is "buried" during Lent. It is resurrected on Easter. Light all seven candles of the seven votive candles shaped like a cross that have been used during Lent. Consider using the candles as a centerpiece for Easter dinner. Write the word Alleluia on post-it notes or index cards. Place them around the candle cross. Say: Christ is risen; He is risen, indeed! Alleluia. Then pray: This is the day the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it. Amen. (Psalm 118:24)
