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As I am sure you are now aware, our Diocese of Southeast Florida has begun the search process for the 4th Bishop of Southeast Florida. Based on the questions I have received in the past few weeks, here are some answers to the most common questions asked:

Fr. Marty Zlatic

Why is this important? The word "Episcopal" means Bishop. We are a denomination that is led by Bishops. As our catechism states, "the ministry of a bishop is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as apostle, chief priest, and pastor of a diocese; to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the whole Church; to proclaim the Word of God; to act in Christ's name for the reconciliation of the world and the building up of the Church; and to ordain others to continue Christ's ministry (p. 855 in BCP)."

What is a Bishop Coadjutor? At our diocesan convention last November, the delegates approved a resolution for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor on January 31, 2015. A Coadjutor Bishop will work side-by-side with our current Bishop (Bishop Leo Frade) until he reaches the mandatory retirement age of 72 in early 2016. Once Bishop Frade retires, the Coadjutor Bishop becomes the new diocesan bishop.

What is the process for electing a bishop? The Standing Committee of the Diocese (elected by Convention) appointed a Search Committee of 18
people from across the diocese, which is charged with the end product of putting forward 5 candidates for Bishop Coadjutor from around the world by the end of October. Prior to that, opportunities are given to collect the opinions and ideas from the entire diocese regarding what we think are the pri-

oritized needs of the church and the world in south Florida. From all of this input, a profile of our diocese is created, from which the Search Committee can begin to fashion a corresponding profile of the gifts and talents needed in our new bishop. Following that, a period of accepting names for nominations takes place, and, by the end of October, the five finalists are announced to the diocese. There is a window of time following this where others can be added to the slate of candidates as well. Then, there is a period of skype interviews and in-person sessions prior to the actual election of January 31, 2015. All the clergy who are canonically resident in this diocese, along with the lay parish delegates from each parish, vote for the new bishop. An election requires a majority of votes from both the clergy and from the lay delegates.

How is this only the 4th Bishop of Southeast Florida? Originally, all of Florida was one Episcopal diocese. As populations grew across the state, additional divisions were made to create new dioceses within the state of Florida. Originally, the Episcopal churches in Florida were administered by the Bishop of New York. However, after the civil war, a separate diocese was established here, and later, this was split further into an additional diocese. Finally, in 1969, the Diocese of South Florida split into 3 distinct dioceses: Central Florida, Southwest Florida, and our current diocese of Southeast Florida. Our diocese goes from Key West in the south to Jensen Beach in the north. The Bishops who have served as diocesan bishops here are:

- The Rt. Rev. James L. Duncan (1969-1980)
- The Rt. Rev. Calvin Onderdonk Schofield (1980-2000)
- The Rt. Rev. Leopold Frade (2000 to present)



EDITOR'S NOTE

How do we get involved in this? The most important thing right now is to pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit for all involved: Bishop Frade, the potential candidates, the Search Committee, and those who will elect the new Bishop. There are extensive Prayers for our Time of Transition available on the diocesan website (http://www.diosef. org/Coadjutor/Coadjutor.shtml). Further, there is the opportunity to complete a survey to give your input as well, which can be found at the same website. It only takes 10-15 minutes. I encourage you to pray and to participate as we look forward to where the Spirit will lead us.

Dear family and friends of St. Joe's,

As I write this we are preparing for Word Beyond

Words at both the 9:30 and the 11:45 (Unplugged) services on the first Sunday in Lent, March 9th, a service expressed in music and movement only. What a perfect Lenten theme... to strive to live our lives carrying out the teachings of Christ in action and not necessarily with words. As we worship the Lord and all that our triune God reveals to us we follow, we serve, and we are renewed.

One way we are being called to action is in the great news we just received. Our Unplugged ministry has been selected as a recipient of The Episcopal Church's Mission Enterprise Zone Grant. This grant is available as an outcome of Resolution A073 passed by our church's last General Convention in 2012. Unplugged's core mission of reaching 20s and 30s and those who are not here yet fits with the criteria for application to this grant serving populations that may not always be served. Since beginning my time here two and a half years ago, I have been in regular communication with the Rev. Tom Brackett, Missioner for New Church Starts & Missional Initiatives with The Episcopal Church Center who encouraged us to apply for this grant. He is a true gift to our Church and I give great thanks for his ministry. Check out his website for his work at www.5marks.org . He and the committee selected by The Episcopal Church will be a great source of support and guidance in this next year. I will meet with them quarterly to receive review and guidance of our ministry plan.

Another way we will act this Lent is in our Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic March 16-22, 2014. We (20 of us!) ask your prayers for our work with the poor. Thanks to the generosity of members of our church and school, and Gulfstream School, we will be taking with us school supplies, shoes, and uniforms for two hundred children who heretofore were unable to attend school without them. We'll be serving the medical and comfort needs of those in a nursing home for the indigent elderly. We'll also be gifting them with shifts and shirts made with love by our Sassy Sewers. We'll be painting one of Fr. Sandino's churches, Santo Tomas in Gautier. We'll also experience cultural exchange activities with the students of San Jose and Santo Tomas in Boca Chica and Gautier, respectively. Our team and church have worked tirelessly. Thanks to all.

We continue outreach to our local community as well with continued work with Habitat for Humanity in one of the poorest sections of Boynton Beach. Look for our next work day coming soon. Join us in a Walk-A-Thon for Family Promise on Sunday, April 6th at 3 p.m. at South County Regional Park. \$10/walker. T-shirts included. Family Promise is a local outreach we support that provides a way for homeless families with children to get back on their feet. Like Habitat, it's a hand up not a hand out.

May this Lent be one of less talk and more action, less gossip and more silent support for one another, less worry and more confidence in Christ as we truly worship in deed the Lord our God.

VOICES IN BRONZE YEAR END RING REPORT 2013



Throughout the year we have been given the opportunity to enhance the worship service by offering musical selections that will complement worship and follow the liturgical seasons of the church year. Our music selections try to encompass many different musical styles from traditional hymn tunes to contem-

porary praise music.

This has been a truly exciting year of individual and collective growth for the Voices in Bronze, which has allowed us to stretch and reach the next level in creating music as a choir.

In March, several members of the handbell choir were able to attend the Florida State Handbell Festival held in Tarpon Springs, FL. There were over 28 handbell choirs or roughly 300 people from various church denominations who attended the two day affair. It was directed by the very talented David Harris, Director of the Raleigh Ringers. The Raleigh Ringers are an internationally acclaimed advanced community handbell choir founded in 1990. They have performed in 39 states, the District of Columbia, Canada and France. Their most popular concert, "One Winter Evening at the Meymandi", is shown regularly on PBS and they have numerous recordings to their credit. It was thrilling and a great opportunity to watch a "master "at work and have David as the director for the ringing sessions, learning how he interprets the musical score and to share his time afterwards talking with the ringers. We also had the opportunity to attend instructional and informative classes for both ringers and directors. The "singing bell" technique which involves using a wooden dowel

being moved around the lip of the bell is one such technique that we learned at the festival. We used this when we played "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" this past Advent. Our Lenten and Spring offerings were all from the music used at the State Festival. It was a chance to recharge the batteries and get excited about playing bells all over again. After the season was over we used 2 weeks to share the classes we attended with each other.

After a brief summer hiatus, we came back ringing in September as we prepared for Advent. Having Georgene playing keyboards has allowed us to expand our repertoire with bells and piano playing together which we did in "I Wonder as I Wander" during Advent.

December 18th saw us on the road traveling to the Healey Rehabilitation Center in Rivera Beach for our annual Advent



service project. Every year, we tease each other by wishing we played piccolos instead of handbells considering all the equipment we have to travel with. That aside, this was our fifth year in presenting a musical program roughly 1 hour in length which means the bell choir must learn almost 10 pieces of music. We perform using the full Voices in Bronze, handbell choir, Vinny as a handbell soloist and our guest pianist, Jim Poch. Fr. Monte read from Isaiah and the Gospel of Luke as we shared the Christmas story through words, song and handbell ringing. Remembering the saying from the film "It's a Wonderful Life": "Every time a bell rings an angel gets its wings", everyone





was presented with a handmade bell necklace. We served the residents and staff holiday cookies and cranberry punch that we had brought with us taking time out to share the gift of music, fun and friendship. It was a wonderful evening for the patients, staff and the ringers alike.

In the coming year we will look forward to raising the bar musically and to continue offering our gifts in worship and service. More important, we are always looking for new ringers. So if you get misty eyed during the movie "It's a Wonderful Life" when they say, "Every time a bell rings an angel gets its wings"... It's time to join the Few, the proud, the ringers of St. Joseph's! Come join our Handbell choir!! No experience necessary. We range from very beginner to the more advanced ringers in an intergenerational choir setting. Recycling and Green Faith efforts at St. Joseph's, kicked off last fall, are in motion. If you missed it in the bulletin on December 29th, Marcos Boronat provided a wonderful summary of the field trips to the Solid Waste Authority (SWA) recycling facilities. That trip gave a broader picture of what happens to discard items and the progressive efforts by SWA to convert trash into energy and other re-useable products. Recycling reduces the need for landfill space. The Policy of Green Faith for St. Joseph's was approved by the vestry and recycling guidelines were published in the bulletin. Thank you all for trying to follow these guidelines during coffee hour and other events at St. Joseph's. The new

recycling containers are being used regularly, and we now are paying less for a smaller trash dumpster and a larger recycling receptacle. The goal is to make recycling easy at church and at home. Not sure about those coffee cups? If empty, please place in the cardboard box paper recycling bin. If not, it goes in the trash. Napkins and paper towels go in the trash. Even though they cannot be recycled, they biodegrade easily in our landfills. Plastic utensils and aluminum foil are currently not recyclable, so they go in the trash. Teach your neighbor or your family. If we switch to recyclable plastic utensils, we'll let you know. Occasional gentle reminders will help to guide us on what goes in what bin during coffee hour. More information on working toward becoming part of the Green Faith initiative, a national interfaith collaborative soon. Interested? Talk with Rosalind Murray, Rev. Wendy, Karen Antonucci or me.

Look for more information in future bulletins about Earth Sunday, April 27th (the Sunday after Easter). We can all support sustainability by participating in local events and bringing this message into our daily lives. What we do CAN make a difference!

We are currently on a three-day-a-week schedule for watering our landscapes, EXCEPT between 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. If you need less, even better! DID YOU KNOW... less frequent water-ing helps our lawns grow deeper roots and survive a drought better?

The stalwart and mighty fine small group of "Garden Angels" are taking a slight rest. Part of the old butterfly garden on the south side of the church became a small shrine to the Sacred Heart. The future of the butterfly garden is in flux. Ideas are welcome. I wish to share a wonderful message on "Bringing Nature Home" by Douglas Tallamy who spoke recently in Palm Beach. It can be heard at <u>www.youtube.com</u>... Planting milkweed flowers supports the dwindling populations of monarch butterflies, which is one of the Earth Hour projects. Our milkweeds seem to be gone, too. As we have heard in past sermons, remember the message that we need to maintain the Earth as it sustains us. "Speak to the Earth and it shall teach thee."
